### Prague, Dresden & Berlin Tour

September 29-October 9

Travel is adventure, and this trip offered our SSTC participants a wonderful experience.

At the airport in Prague, we were met by our outstanding tour escort Sarka, who welcomed us to her beautiful city, full of Old World charm. Following an orientation-to-the-city bus ride, we settled in at Hotel Adria. It was located on St. Wenceslas Square, Vaclavske Namesti, the site of the "Velvet Revolution" in 1989 when the Czech Republic gained its independence from the Soviet Union. We arrived on St. Wenceslas Day, a national holiday celebrating the Czech Republic's Patron Saint and Czech statehood, putting us at the center of the celebration. After sorting out some room assignments that had two single roommates sharing one bed, which was more "togetherness" than planned, we had our welcome dinner in the hotel's Neptune Room.

The next day Sarka led us on a full-day walking tour of Prague. The city is the only major Central European capital to escape the bombing of the last century's wars, and thus it is one of the best- preserved cities in Europe, offering diverse architectural styles from Gothic towers and spires, Baroque domes, pastel facades of Art Nouveau, and modern structures like the Dancing House, "Fred and Ginger". We certainly had limitless things to take photos of.

Prague has a compact historical center, which lends itself to walking tours. It started out as four towns, and on this day we visited the Old Town and the New Town (a mere 600 years old). Highlights of our tour included watching the incredibly complex Astronomical Clock at the Old Town Hall strike at the top of the hour and put on a glockenspiel show, visiting several historic synagogues in the Jewish Quarter, including the Pinkas Synagogue with its somber memorial to the victims of The Holocaust, and stopping at the statue of Jan Hus, to learn about this Czech priest who protested Church corruption, was martyred in 1415, and today is considered a national hero. By the end of the day everyone wearing a step-tracking watch had met and surpassed their goal of 10,000 steps, with an estimated 7 miles walked, on cobblestones to boot! Some in our group still had enough energy to go shopping for the garnet jewelry Prague is known for.

A relaxing dinner cruise on the Vltava River was our reward for being walking superstars. We were fortunate that the Vltava River had recently reopened to boat traffic, after devastating flooding had impacted parts of the Czech Republic just a few weeks prior. While enjoying a buffet meal we cruised past city sites lit up at night, an enchanting scene.



Day two of our Prague tour involved visiting the other two towns, Lesser Town and Castle Quarter. Lesser Town, once settled by nobility and now home to the Czech Parliament and American Embassy, is the location of the Lennon Wall. From singer John Lennon's death in 1980 until Czech independence in 1989, this wall, covered with "All You Need is Love" and "Imagine" graffiti, was seen as a place of hope for freedom-seeking locals, despite the fact that the police were charged with painting over the "subversive" graffiti every night. Today it is still a place to come to imagine, and the city now pays artists to repaint the wall. It was the perfect backdrop for our group to "Come Together" for a group photo.

No surprise here: Castle Quarter is home to Prague Castle, seat of Czech power for more than a thousand years. Situated on a hill overlooking the Vltava River, it offered us scenic views of gardens

and the city below. After hiking up the castle hill and back down, we crossed one of Prague's defining landmarks, the Charles Bridge, ending the day's tour. We dined that night in the unique, stalactite-decorated Triton Restaurant, savoring the local cuisine.

On day four we toured Vysehrad Castle, the first seat of Czech dukes. As we viewed some statues in a park setting, Sarka told us about ancient Slavic legends that tell the tale of Princess Libuse, the mythic founder of Prague, who decided to build a castle at Vysehrad, and is credited with calling the place where it stood, Praha (Prague), meaning threshold. There was also a statue and legend about our tour escort's namesake, Sarka, who used her feminine wiles in a losing battle-of-the-sexes war for domination of Prague following the end of Princess Libuse's dynasty. We ended our visit at the Vysehrad National Cemetery and the Slavin tomb, the final resting place of many culturally significant Czech people.

Next we bused to Konopiste. Following lunch at Zamecka Restaurace, known for its game menu and hunting-themed décor, we toured Konopiste Castle. This was the residence



of hunting-obsessed Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the Austro-Hungarian Empire, whose assassination sparked World War I and the end of monarchies throughout Europe. Returning to Prague, we spent the evening dining at the Folklore Garden Restaurant and enjoying the Folklore Show, where, after a few beers, several members of our group joined the cast on stage, and danced with cast members (Sandy), or brooms (Don and Steve).

Departing Prague by bus on Day 5 in a light rain, Sarka told us the city was crying because we were leaving. Without fail, as we left the cities of Dresden and Berlin also, a light rain fell, and the cities wept to see us go. Fortunately, we encountered fair weather the rest of the time. At Terezin, a tour was led by a local guide, through the Terezin Concentration Camp, the Nazi's model Jewish town meant to deceive International Red Cross inspectors, while in reality it was an inhumane ghetto. Virtually all of Terezin's 155,000 Jewish inmates ultimately ended up dying, either at Terezin or in extermination camps. The gray sky of the day matched the somber mood of the tour.

We stopped in Zubrnice, a town known for its open-air museum, and had lunch. Then on to Dresden, where we checked into Hotel Amedia Plaza, and later had dinner of "Saxon delights" at Restaurant Sophienkellar. Not everyone tried the "lard balls"! Local guide Wolfgang joined us on day 6 for a tour of Dresden. We drove by bus along the Elbe River, noting the vineyards and villas, and crossed over the historic "Blue Wonder" bridge, fortunately not the one that had recently collapsed into the river. Next came a walking tour of the city, which was firebombed during World War II and suffered nearly complete destruction. Highlights included the Semper Opera House, the Baroque masterpiece Zwinger, filled with museums, and a walk on Bruhl's Terrace, known as the "balcony of Europe", along the Elbe River.



Wolfgang was again our guide on day 7 in Meissen, where we had the opportunity to visit a porcelain factory and see demonstrations of the process of creating and decorating the porcelain the town is known for. The following day we stopped in Wittenberg, officially Lutherstadt Wittenberg, the city of Luther and the birthplace of his Protestant Reformation. At the Church of All Saints, Rich Bergt posed for a photo with a children's book on Luther authored by his sister, in front of the door where Luther nailed his 95 Theses. The day's final destination was Berlin, where we checked into H4 Hotel Berlin Alexanderplatz, in the former East Berlin.

Our tour of Berlin on Day 9 was led by guide Aaron "Birchy", a British expat who followed his heart and came to Berlin to marry his German girlfriend at historic (dating from 1270) St. Mary's Church, which became a guidepost to us as we frequently passed it on the route to and from our hotel. The guided sightseeing included the restored Reichstag, where the Bundestag or German parliament meets, Charlottenburg Palace, Museum Island, the Siegessaule with

a bronze sculpture of the goddess of victory atop the column, the Holocaust Memorial, the location of Hitler's bunker where he committed suicide, the remains of the Berlin Wall that once divided the city, and the Brandenburg Gate, where we gathered for a group photo.

On our tour of Sachsenhausen on Day 10, guide Aaron was joined by guide Paul, an Irish expat. They helped us navigate the S-Bahn train and a bus ride to get to our destination and back. Thankfully, they were tall guys so we could see their heads above the crowds on the packed public transportation vehicles and follow them to get off at the correct stops. Sachsenhausen was the first concentration camp build by the Nazi regime. It was intended to be a prison work camp, first for Hitler's political opponents in 1936 and later for Jews, Jehovah's Witnesses and others deemed an enemy by Hitler. Tens of thousands died here, while thousands more were sent elsewhere to be killed in death camps. It continued as a prison for political opponents of the Soviet state, and 12,000 more died here before the camp was closed in 1950. Today it is a memorial and reminder of the dark days of Nazi Germany. Travel is freedom, and this camp, along with the Berlin Wall, stand in stark contrast to this freedom.

Our last full day in Germany included a trip to Potsdam and the Cecilienhof Palace. It was here at the end of World War II in Europe that Truman, Stalin, and Churchill met to draw up the postwar map of Europe, dividing Berlin into East and West sides, and setting the stage for the Cold War with the USSR. We also strolled around Sanssouci Palace, the small but still opulent summer home of Frederic the Great, the man who introduced the potato to his subjects in the 1700's. Potatoes were a staple of the hearty meals we consumed in both the Czech Republic and Germany.

We drove over the "Bridge of Spies", of Cold War fame, on our return to Berlin, where we celebrated Octoberfest at our farewell dinner in the Hofbrauhaus Berlin. It was a festive way to end our tour. Travel is an opportunity to see new things, meet new people, learn, share an adventure with fellow travelers, and generate fond memories. We were able to "czech" everything on the list with this tour!





## MOONSHINE: CASEY, IL Day trip

The weather was simply perfect for the drive through the country to the Moonshine Store, Casey, IL Big Things and Tuscan Hills Winery in Effingham. No one knew what to expect of Moonshine, but the service was fast, and the hamburgers were fresh and very tasty! It was

so relaxing sitting outside at the picnic tables eating our burgers, enjoying the beautiful weather, and petting the resident dog.





We then found our way to Casey, IL. Prior to the guided bus tour, everyone had a chance to explore downtown Casey to the find the World's Largest Rocking Chair, Teeter- Totter, Mailbox, Wooden Shoes, Wind Chime, Key, Barber's Pole and other "big things" such as the bird cage, ear of corn, rocking horse, jigsaw puzzle, yardstick, pencil, piggy bank, bookworm, mousetrap, knitting needles, crochet hook, and spinning top. After boarding the bus with a tour guide, a very enjoyable and enlightening history of Casey, IL and how the big things came to be was given as we drove past each attraction in down-





town and outlying areas. Our group especially enjoyed picture taking with the World's Largest Pitchfork!

The day ended beautifully at Tuscan Hills Winery in Effingham with good food, wine, lots of laughter and good conversation!

The current board's goal is to make sure you are in the know!

### How do I find out what is scheduled?

- First, an eblast is sent alerting you to an event or activity. An eblast is an email sent to all members. All eblast have SSTC in the subject line.
- Next, the event is promoted on Facebook. Follow us on Facebook. Facebook is used to promote events and is not monitored daily. If you have a question, please contact the board member or trip leader directly. Their contact information is in the eblast or our directory.
- In addition, it is on your website's calendar. www.springfieldskiclub.org. Your newsletter, the Snowjourner, also provides you with events and activities. The Snowjourner is published online at the beginning of each month. An eblast, along with a notice on Facebook lets you know of its availability. If you paid for a mailed copy, it is always sent at the first of the month, and is subject to the priorities of the postal system. Usually there is a delay, and events may have already happened. My advice is be proactive, check other sources.

### I'm not getting eblasts. Who should I contact?

- First, check your junk mail. Sometimes, depending on your email system, email is automatically routed there.
- Next, if your email has changed, or you would like an email added, notify the VP of membership. (The email used is the one listed on the membership application)

### I have a family membership. Can more than one email be used to receive the eblast?

Absolutely, just send the additional email addresses to the VP of membership.

Remember, to watch for Eblast, Facebook post, and the website to stay In the Know!

### UNDERSTANDING VOLUNTEER HOURS

Have you enjoyed SSTC's monthly dining out, day trips, sporting activities, monthly happy hours, or international travel? Have you enjoyed holiday parties, summer picnics at Larry Michaud's, or an Oktoberfest at Roger Schnelten's?

We are an "all-volunteer" club. These opportunities are a possibility for all club members through the generosity of donating time and talent. Countless hours are spent behind the scenes creating international trips, day trips, parties, processing membership information, publishing the directory, creating fliers, writing Snow-journer articles, processing membership information, choosing venues, hosting parties, and leading activities. Most importantly volunteer hours are a way for you to get to know other club members, even if you have a lifetime membership.

### Did you know that your volunteer hours can earn you early sign-up privileges at our trip sign-up parties?

Don't miss out. Trips often have limited space. Those members that accumulate 10 volunteer hours will, upon request to the executive vice president at least 14 days prior to the sign-up party, receive this certificate.

### When is the next opportunity to use a certificate?

Vice Presidents and Chairpersons are responsible for submitting any hours earned to the executive Vice President. Next sign-up party is September 9th. There are many day trips, sporting activities and an international trip on the horizon. If you checked the volunteer box on the yearly membership application, the Vice President or Chairperson has a list with your name.

### Who do I contact to earn volunteer hours?

On your membership application you checked a box indicating your area of interest for volunteering. You may be contacted from this list. In addition, eblasts are sent offering opportunities. My suggestion is don't wait... Be Proactive. Contact a VP or Chairperson and let them know of your willingness to earn those hours. Each committee can always use help.

### How far in advance of a trip do I need to earn the hours?

The cut-off for earning, submitting, and requesting a certificate is 14 days prior to the date of the sign-up party. Certificate holders have third priority sign-up privileges after executive board members and trip leaders. A hard copy of the certificate must be handed to the Trip Leader at the time of the sign-up. Securing this certificate also means that trip application requirements, certificate and check may be hand delivered to the Trip Leader prior to the sign-up event.

\*\*Note: 10 hours is needed for each trip.\*\*

### If I have a certificate, am I guaranteed that I will have a spot on the trip?

A certificate does not guarantee a trip is locked in, but it does increase your chances of securing the trip you desire. Everything is based on the number of travelers a contract allows and the tier of applications received by the trip leader; board members, trip leaders, certificate holders, then all other members.

### Interested in serving on the Executive Board?

You earn 10 volunteer hours for each year you serve on the executive board, plus you have first tier sign up. If you would like to be considered for an executive board position, contact the Executive Vice President.

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### **STANDING RULE #2**

### CANCELLATION & REFUND POLICY (11/14/96), (Amended 5/13/99, 4/9/05 and 1/8/15)

"Cutoff' dates and non-refundable deposits for trips and activities may vary according to transportation, lodging or other associated deposits. Cutoff dates for trips and activities will be established for each trip or activity by the Executive Board and published in the monthly newsletter. All cancellations must be made to the Trip Leader in writing or via e-mail. Refunds will be made as follows:

- For cancellations before the published cutoff date, a full refund of all monies paid will be issued in a timely manner, less any
  Executive Board-approved cancellation processing fee established and published in conjunction with the trip or activity
  advertisement in the monthly newsletter.
- 2. For cancellations after the cutoff date, refunds will be as follows:
  - a. For any trip or activity where the allotted number of spaces are completely reserved and a replacement can be found, a cancellation may be made and a full refund issued, less any processing fees, as described in paragraph 1, above, any time prior to the departure of the trip or the start of the activity, provided the replacement person pays the full amount due, in accordance with the payment schedule for the trip or activity.
  - b. If a replacement cannot be found, the member canceling the trip or activity may submit, in person, in writing, or via email, a request for a refund. This request must be sent to either the trip leader, the appropriate VP or directly to the Executive Board. The request must be submitted within 15 days after the scheduled start date of the trip or activity and shall state the reason for the cancellation and the amount of refund requested. Requests will only be considered by the Executive Board, and refunds will only be made, once the trip or activity is completed and the full financial statement has been submitted for review and approval, as described in Standing Rule #13. Any refund approved by the Executive Board will come from recoverable expenditures derived from the specific trip or activity and not from the Club's general fund.
  - c. Refunds will be distributed no later than 180 days after the first scheduled day of the trip or activity.

### STANDING RULE #5

### TRIP MANAGEMENT AND CONDUCT (11/14/96), (Amended 4/9/05 and 1/8/15)

- 1. All Trip Leaders shall be at least 21 years of age.
- 2. Trips shall be run as advertised, unless ski conditions, safety or wellbeing of trip participants dictate otherwise, in which case, the decision for an alternate plan rests with the Vice President of Ski Trips, Day Trips. or Tour Trips (as appropriate) or the President prior to departure. After departure, this authority rests with the trip leader.
- 3. Conduct by any individual which is offensive or hazardous to others or that does not project a good image of the Club could result in expulsion from the trip at the nearest place of public lodging or transportation by the authority of the trip leader. The trip leader will provide a review of the circumstances at the next Executive Board meeting with a board decision to maintain or cancel the individual's Club membership.
- 4. Individuals will be held responsible for any damage to personal or real property of others.
- 5. Club arranged accommodations cannot be shared with non-trip participants.

## STANDING RULE #7 GROUND TRANSPORTATION SMOKING POLICY (11/14/96)

- Smoking will only be allowed during scheduled stops approximately every two hours of travel, if requested. NO smoking inside the travel vehicle is allowed.

# STANDING RULE #8 PARTIAL SKI TRIP PACKAGES (11/14/96) (amended 4/9/05)

- For trips involving a request to delete air (or other packaged form of transportation) service, only the actual cost of the ticket will be
  deducted from the trip price. The participant's portion of the club's overhead cost, including ground transportation to the airport or rail
  station used for the trip, will be included in the partial trip price.
- All requests for partial trip packages will only be honored to the point where the Club may drop reserved seats without penalty from the tour operator and/or the carrier.
- 3. If a request for a partial trip participation is made and honored, the participant must make payment in the full amount within 5 days of the approval notification. A "partial" trip payment is not refundable unless the trip is canceled. CANCELLATION CUT-OFF DATES DO NOT APPLY. The club will not refund or attempt to "resell" partial trip packages should the participant drop from the trip any time after payment is made.
- 4. Requests to exclude lift tickets from a trip package must be made at the time of sign up.
